From my Fathers Pen - Reflections on Retirement

Looking back, I am amazed at the varied things I have done in the 30 years since retiring at age 57 years. In the early months, I felt a little sorry for myself imagining I no longer had any real purpose. Enter my wife. She gave me a good kick up the rear and set me thinking about what I could offer the world with the experience I had gained from my life in industry.

The answer was to volunteer.

Now my father had always warned me against volunteering for anything, but here goes nothing—head over the parapet and charge!

My first effort was to become involved with the local Police Community Consultative Group. This gave me an entirely different view of policing and law enforcement. The local Inspector was a fast-track graduate who completely re-shaped community policing at that time and was never afraid to get involved at the front line.

I well remember one Christmas with unrest brewing; he cancelled all leave, (which made him very popular), and took his place on the streets with his troops.

However, the call of my previous life was still strong, so I decide to try my hand at Business Consultancy. ROBERTS GREEN TOMATO CHUTNEY

This year, the weather didn't quite play ball. Our summer was far from the sun-soaked, tomato-ripening dream we all hoped for. Instead, we faced a string of grey days and chilly nights, resulting in an abundance of underripe tomatoes clinging stubbornly to their vines.

But, as they say, when life gives you lemons, make lemonade. Or in our case, when life gives you green tomatoes, make green tomato chutney! Our lacklustre summer led to a bumper crop of these underripe gems, which we transformed into a tangy, flavourful chutney. This delicious concoction not only saved our tomatoes from waste but also added a zingy new addition to our pantry staples. Here's to turning seasonal disappointments into culinary delights!



INGREDIENTS

1 kg green tomatoes, chopped
2 large onions, finely chopped
3 cloves of garlic, minced
2 green chilies, chopped
(optional, for a bit of heat)
200g brown sugar
250ml cider vinegar
1 tbsp mustard seeds
1 tbsp ground ginger
1 tsp ground turmeric
1 tsp ground allspice
1 tsp salt

METHOD

Place the chopped green tomatoes, onions, garlic, and green chilies (if using) into a large, heavy-based pan. Add the brown sugar, cider vinegar, mustard seeds, ground ginger, turmeric, allspice, and salt to the pan. Stir well to combine.

Bring the mixture to a gentle boil over medium heat, then reduce the heat and simmer. Allow it to cook slowly for about 1 to 1.5 hours, stirring occasionally, until the chutney has thickened, and the vegetables are soft.

Once the chutney has reached your desired consistency, remove it from the heat and let it cool slightly. Spoon the chutney into sterilized jars, seal them tightly, and allow them to cool completely. Store in a cool, dark place for at least two weeks to let the flavours mature. Once opened, keep refrigerated.

Enjoy your green tomato chutney with cheese, meats, or as a tangy addition to sandwiches!
